
STATE & FEDERAL LAND LEASES

The American Lung Association's State of the Air 2018 Report

For the first time, the city of Casper was named to all three of the cleanest cities lists for ozone, year-round particle pollution, and short-term particle pollution. The city of Cheyenne ranks as the number one cleanest city for year-round particle pollution and is one of the cleanest cities for short-term particle pollution.
